
My visit to the Miriam P. Brenner Children's Museum


Another area I can visit in The Edible Schoolyard is the Music Fence. I can use sticks or my hands to make different sounds.





After visiting The Edible Schoolyard, I build a fort using the big blue blocks. I try to balance the blocks to make my fort stand tall. I am proud of what I built.






Now, it's time to go. My grown-up let's me know when it is time to leave.
